ENCOURAGING LETTER FROM THE GENERAL CONFERENCE

May 2000

The EUD is a division of great strengths and potentials. I have noted with pleasure the many activities and the future plans. WORLD HEALTH LEADERS MEETING IN TORONTO Reports - Priorities - Challenges

During the GC sessions' week Dr Handysides provided an opportunity for a meeting with world Division Health Department leaders. In the reports and subsequent discussions several facts clearly pointed out:

- 1. The health message continues to be the entering wedge of the Gospel.
- 2. The health message, the "right arm" of the Church, is crippled in many places.
- 3. The health needs differ greatly according to the area of the world, economical development, and culture. However, the basic principles of health reform, expressed in the NEWSTART lifestyle, continue unchanged and must continue to be the basis in all health promotion efforts.

The health principles must be implemented in all Adventist institutions (hospitals, schools, retirement homes, publishing houses, Union and Conference offices, etc.) and proclaimed from the pulpits not as a separate message but as an integral part of the plan of redemption.

4. Besides that, special emphasis may be put on different programs according to specific needs: smoking cessation, cooking classes, stress management seminars, AIDS prevention, etc.

We live in a time when the youth, both outside and inside our church, needs and is open to prevention regarding alcohol, drugs, and risky sexual behavior. It is time to promote and integrate the AY2Y program in all youth activities.

- 5. The need of more networking between Divisions for exchange of ideas, materials, and speakers. This will greatly potentiate our efforts and give more efficient use of our resources.
- 6. Several physicians were ordained in the South American Division during the past years. This procedure is recommended not only for those physicians who besides of medicine also have an academic degree in theology but for all those physicians who dedicated their lives entirely to the Lord's service, as advised by Ellen G. White in Counsels on Health, p. 540: "The work of the true medical missionary is largely a spiritual work. It includes prayer and the laying on of hands; he therefore should be as sacredly set apart for his work as is the minister of the gospel. Those who are selected to act the part of missionary physicians are to be set apart as such. This will strengthen them against the temptations to withdraw from the sanitarium work to engage in private practice."

FADS AND QUESTIONS ON NUTRITION

What about Spirulina or Blue-Green Algae?

Spirulina is a brand name of Blue-Green Algae or "Pond Scum" which comes from the scum that covers many stagnant bodies of water. It is composed of microscopic plants which cause the water to smell foul and taste bad. Health claims for it is that it is a perfect food that contains all the necessary nutrients to help individuals with medical challenges, that it is a super source of protein with 65-71% complete protein, a plant source of vit. B_{12} , or with the brand Chorella that it contains the miracle Chlorophyll. It is stated that Blue-Green Algae is an anti-bacterial agent and that no other organism can survive in the water. They claim it is natural.

What are the facts? It is actually a highly refined product extracted by chemicals. In its natural form it has poisoned animals. The protein is of poor quality; comparable to peanut protein. A recommended dose contains less protein than a half slice of whole wheat bread. The Food and Drug Administration study shows the B_{12} is probably due to fecal matter, feathers and insects.

Chlorophyll is not absorbed by the body. In spite of this being eaten by cows they still may get cancer.

REPORTS FROM THE FIELD

Romania - More Health in the Media

"For two weeks now, I am doing a weekly, half hour health information and education magazine for the National Radio Station (Cultural Channel). It came as a surprise, and the people there are very open and interested in bringing and promoting a healthy lifestyle. We are trying to make the best out of this blessed opportunity. Pray for us.

We had the second Bucharest edition of the Health Expo, and last week there was another one in Giurgiu, a town on the border with Bulgaria. The attendance was high as usually, with the highest medical and civil authorities in Giurgiu attending the opening ceremony. Last night we have been invited to the local TV station in Giurgiu and spoke live on vegetarian nutrition and NEWSTART for an hour."

Romania - Medical Office in Bucharest

"We recently opened an Adventist Medical Center in Bucharest with 3 offices, one seminar room and a laboratory. At the present time, we have one family physician and one Natural Remedies specialist. There is already a 600 patients waiting list. We also have 1 or 2 health education seminars every week, and the participation is good. We are currently working to open the laboratory, where we have the equipment to do most of the necessary blood tests. We are hoping to get a contract with the Medical Insurance Company for the laboratory, too.

We need to get a second hand ultrasound machine. This would be very helpful, and would significantly increase the appeal of the patients to our Center."

Adventist Scientist Comments on Retraction of Evolutionary "Missing Link" Claim

The retraction by the prestigious National Geographic magazine of its claim to have presented "a true missing link" connecting dinosaur evolution to birds has been welcomed by the head of the Seventh-day Adventist Church's Geoscience Research Institute.

In its November 1999 issue, National Geographic claimed that a fossil recovered from China portrayed an "Archaeoraptor," a kind of "feathered dinosaur" that supposedly linked dinosaurs to birds in an evolutionary series. A panel of experts convened by the magazine after doubts were raised concluded on April 6 that the fossil was a composite of two different animals. After a brief "correction" in its March issue, the magazine has said it will be publishing a report in the Fall on the contentious issue.

"This situation does illustrate the benefits of being cautious in rushing to conclusions," comments Dr. James Gibson, head of the Loma Linda-based Geoscience Research Institute. "There's a danger in presuming, and it's easy to see what you expect to see."

The investigating panel concluded that the feathered dinosaur fossil had not received independent scientific corroboration, as would be expected for such a finding and before making any claims.

"There's a lesson here for creationists as well as evolutionists," says Gibson. "You have to look at

the evidence, and you need to suspend judgment until you know the whole story. You shouldn't be rushing to conclusions, and not everything that is published is proved to be correct over time."

Seventh-day Adventists are supporters of creationism and reject the theory of Darwinian evolution. [Jonathan Gallagher]

Czech Adventist Health Workers Launch Educational CD-ROM

Kromeriz, Czech Republic [ANN Bulletin: April 18, 2000]

Adventist doctors and nurses joined with the civic organization Life and Health for a health convention held April 7-9 in Kromeriz. During the convention, Adventist health workers launched a new instructional CD-ROM designed to present principles for healthy living in an accessible, easy-to-understand format.

"Research shows that lifestyle impacts our health significantly," said the producer of the CD-ROM, Petr Skrla, Ph.D., director of the Seventh-day Adventist health department in the Czech Republic. "The new CD-ROM is intended to provide the latest scientific information in an attractive format to all who would like to participate in propagating a healthy lifestyle."

The convention focused not only on motivating doctors, nurses, and volunteers to be involved in instruction in the areas of healthy lifestyle and prevention of addictions, but also offered professional lectures and seminars.

"It is very important for all who want to work in the area of health to stay constantly in touch with the newest scientific knowledge regarding a healthy lifestyle. Conventions like this one are good opportunities to gain access to new information," said Jana Krynska, M.D., chief of the pulmonary department of Bata's Hospital in Zlin and chair of Life and Health.

In addition to the formal presentation, professional workshops for doctors, nurses, and instructional workers were held. More than 200 participants attended the convention. [Bedrich Jetelina]

Walk Around the World 2000

More than 4,500 Seventh-day Adventist young people marched in the streets of 20 Romanian cities on May 28 to call for greater public awareness of the dangers of tobacco and other drugs. All together summed 40,000 km which is actually the circumference of the earth! This is really Walking Around the World!

In Bucharest, in a smoldering heat, 600 youth

marched 9 km, thus making a total of 5,400 km. The line of marchers was 500 meters-long and was opened by a coffin with a couple of huge cigarettes (6 m long) followed by many banners exposing the dangers of smoking. The marchers had blue-and-white caps with the words "Be Smart - Don't Smoke!"

The same evening the largest TV network (PRO-TV) gave a very positive coverage prime time hour (about 4 minutes), unfortunately without men-



tioning the Adventist church which was sponsoring the event. The news was also included in their international program and repeated the next morning. The news editor was commenting that in a time when people go to the streets for all kind of personal interests, it's incredible to see these radiant young men and women marching for the sake of others' life and health. Many local stations featured the marches from other cities.
